Annette Chambers-Smith, chairperson of the committee, welcomed the committee members and guests. Ms. Chambers-Smith discussed the meeting agenda. A motion was made and was seconded to approve the August 2021 Standards Committee Meeting Minutes from the 151<sup>st</sup> Congress of Correction in Nashville, Tennessee. The motion was approved unanimously.

ACA President, Tony Parker welcomed the committee members and guests to Phoenix. Mr. Parker spoke on the unprecedented times, and commended everyone on working together to complete the mission of corrections.

ACA Executive Director James A. Gondles, Jr. welcomed new committee members and ACA staff. Mr. Gondles encouraged everyone to attend the healthcare reception at the Sheraton Valley of the Sun ballroom beginning at 5:30 p.m.

Commission Chair, Mr. Thomas Stickrath recognized current and new commission members. Mr. Stickrath mentioned that 157 facilities were up for accreditation, 9 of which were initial audits, and 38 international audits from Mexico, and the first from Costa Rica.

**Existing Standard:** Written policy, procedure, and practice require that between the warden/superintendent and assistant warden/superintendent(s), each institution's living and activity areas shall be visited weekly within a schedule that ensures the warden/superintendent personally conducts rounds in all areas no less than one time per month. In addition, designated department heads shall visit the institution's living

**Proposal:** Written policy, procedure and practice require that the assistant warden/superintendent(s) and designated department heads shall conduct rounds within a rotating schedule that ensures all living and activity areas are visited at least weekly to encourage informal contact with staff and inmates and to informally observe living and working conditions. The warden/superintendent shall personally conduct rounds in all living and activity areas at least once during the month. In the event of a prolonged absence of the warden/superintendent a designee may be appointed to conduct the required rounds.

**Comments:** Although the Colorado Department of Corrections is in agreement that the warden/superintendent should make rounds of all living and activity areas of their facilities; the current expected practice language of having the warden/superintendent and assistant warden/superintendent(s) visit all areas weekly is an unrealistic expectation for larger facilities or for wardens/superintendents and assistant wardens/superintendent(s) that oversee more than one facility. Smaller facilities don't always have both positions which further puts an unrealistic expectation on the one person who is fulfilling two roles. In facilities that have both positions. the expectation that the assistant wardens/superintendents are to visit all living and activity areas that the warden/superintendent didn't or couldn't visit during the week is also unrealistic and lends itself to the completion of living and working conditions which is what the Colorado Department of Corrections believes to be the desired intent of the expected practice.

I do not believe the current expectations are unrealistic."

These units should have 24 hour services such as nursing and availability of a QMHP, behavioral health trained correctional officers, and clinical programming. Individual Treatment Plans which will define the types and frequency of contacts with mental health staff for inmates in the program, housing to meet the therapeutic needs of the inmate and transition plan upon discharge from the inpatient care unit.
- **Proposed Text:** Inpatient Care Unit is available for those who are in need of inpatient mental health treatment. Where a facility has an inpatient care unit, these units should have 24 hour services such as nursing and availability of a QMHP, behavioral health trained correctional officers, and clinical programming. Individual Treatment Plans which will define the types and frequency of contacts with mental health staff for inmates in the program, housing to meet the therapeutic needs of the inmate and transition plan upon discharge from the inpatient care unit.
- **Comments:** The wording of the standard requires the facility to have an Inpatient Care Unit. There are ACI facilities that do not have the space or manning available to provide this service. The standard should be that these services are made available, however, if the facility has an Inpatient Care Unit then these standard need to be met.

**Comments:** Since the removal of the nighttime noise threshold from the standard, which was a much lower threshold than daytime, taking nighttime readings would seem to be an effort in futility. It stands to reason that if daytime readings are within the allowable limits, any nighttime readings would certainly be within the same limits as there is much less noise during nighttime hours.
